Why not adapt the idea of pilgrimage to the modern age? Make one to somewhere meaningful to you. How about the village where your grandmother was born? You might even bump into some

of her old neighbours and learn things about her you never knew.

■ Holiday on your doorstep: Globalisation and immigration have brought the world's cultures to our doorsteps. Become a backyard anthropologist and cultivate a curiosity about your neighbours from different nations.

Have a conversation with a stranger once a week, such as the woman who sells you a newspaper every morning, and find out about the world she has left behind.

**Try sensory travel:** Tourism has become an incredibly visual experience: we see the sights, snap photos and film everything that moves.

But why not use our other senses for a change? Put the map away and allow yourself to get lost in a new city.

Follow the medieval scent of smoked fish and you might find yourself in a colourful food market. Pursue the sound of birdsong and discover a park.

In the 21st century, there's no need for us to slavishly collect landmarks on our travels. Surely it's better to collect experiences that change the way we look at the world and our own lives?  $\square$
